BIBLE ADVENTURES SCRIPT:A1809~ Joseph in Prison.

## Welcome to Bible Adventures. Help for today. Hope for tomorrow. Jesus is Lord of all.

Today's *Bible Adventure* continues the story of Jacob's 11<sup>th</sup> son, Joseph, who was sold into slavery by his older 10 brothers in revenge for him being favoured by their father. Joseph worked faithfully as a slave in Egypt for his owner, Potiphar, for many years. God blessed Joseph's work caring for Potiphar's business affairs. However, Potiphar's wife regularly tried to entice him into committing sin with her. In anger, she took revenge on him, making up a story for her Husband, who had Joseph thrown into prison.

Every person at some point in life will be falsely accused and judged by others, just like Joseph was. The issue may be minor and most likely, will not result in a prison term. But God is concerned with how we each respond in such circumstances, whether the issue be minor or large, private or public. Will these trials reveal a godly character inside or a selfdefensive one? If punished for something we didn't do, will we become bitter and angry at people and God?

We can do at least three things that'll help us bear our trials. Firstly, like Joseph, we can maintain a clear conscience at all times. This involves avoiding all known sin against God, including various sins in our attitude and thoughts such as bitterness, anger, jealousy, unthankfulness and an unforgiving spirit. Secondly, commit each situation we find ourselves in to the Lord in prayer; trust that He will work all things for His good and righteous purposes.

And thirdly, we need to keep our thoughts focused on the presence of God and being in right relationship with Him. God has promised never to leave us or forsake us as we abide in Him, and we're to hold onto that promise and believe it every day. Then we'll not only be able to bear our trials and benefit from them, we'll even learn how to honour our God and rejoice despite them.

Just how far Joseph was humbled by God can only be imagined! Prisons in Joseph's days were very rough, tough places where prisoners were controlled by guards with whips. Joseph didn't know how long he was to stay in prison. Having been jailed instead of killed, which was Potiphar's mercy to a slave who had no right, Joseph could expect to be in jail for life. However, the Bible indicates that Joseph had hope that one day the king would redeem him. Without hope and while suffering under terrible conditions, prisoners will give up on living back in society and instead, long for death.

In today's *Bible Adventure* drama, Joseph settled into prison life among the hardened prisoners held in the king's prison.

## DRAMA - <u>The Bible In Living Sound</u>.

Joseph might have been in prison but he wasn't forgotten by the Lord. Again, God gave him great favour with the jail keeper. Soon Joseph was doing things to help the jail keeper and eventually, Joseph took over responsibility of running the prison and supervising the workload of the other prisoners. Because God was with Joseph, everything Joseph did prospered. So the jail keeper had little to be concerned about. After a while, two new prisoners were brought in. They were the chief butler and the chief baker of the king Pharaoh. Pharaoh had been angry with them and as a result, he threw them into the prison where Joseph was in charge. This is recorded in the Bible in Genesis, Chapter 40.

These two officials of Pharaoh both had dreams and were troubled by them, as they didn't understand what they meant. Joseph reminded the two that only God could correctly interpret dreams or anyone God gave the knowledge of interpretation to. Joseph then offered to tell what the dreams meant. The interpretations weren't obvious, especially the chief baker's. And naturally, he was upset when Joseph told him that the king was going to kill him in 3 days' time. The chief butler's life, however, was to be spared.

Joseph asked the chief butler to remember him to the king when the king restored him to his former position; he needed Pharaoh to look into Joseph's case if he was ever to get out. Three days later, Pharaoh took the chief baker's life but restored the chief butler to his former position, just like their dreams had indicated. But the chief butler forgot all about Joseph when he was back serving the king. And Joseph remained as overseer of running the prison for the next 2 full years. How many times do we promise to do something or pray for someone yet in the busyness of life, forget our promises? In Psalm 103, it says: "Let all that I am praise the LORD; may I never forget the good things he does for me."

With the chief butler's lack of remembering Joseph comes one of the most famous Christian stories about forgetfulness that happened in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. When Charles Spurgeon was a teenager, he was a promising preacher but untrained. A friend arranged for him to meet with the principal of a theological school and this meeting was to take place in the home of a well-known publisher.

Spurgeon arrived on time. A maid led him to a different room from the one where the principal was waiting to interview him. After a 2-hour wait, Spurgeon rang the bell for the maid. At that point he learned to his dismay, that the principal had waited a long time in the interview room for him but by now, had left to catch his train back to the city.

Spurgeon was terribly disappointed, but soon accepted the situation as divinely ordered. Later, however, he determined not to reapply for the theological admission when he believed that God had spoken to him with these words, "Are you seeking great things for yourself? Seek them not!" God doesn't want believers in Christ to depend on their theological training but upon Himself!"

Receiving what God wants to give us depends on us being rightly connected to Him. The Bible tells us that we are all in need of forgiveness from God. We've all committed sin and in 1 John, Chapter 1, it says: "If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us." Each and every sin is ultimately an act of rebellion against God. As a result, we desperately need God's forgiveness. And this is what God is willing to give us. If our sins aren't forgiven, we'll spend eternity separated from God and suffer from this separation forever. But God's forgiveness of our sins is fully available if we just place our belief in the saving, cleansing and forgiving power of Jesus Christ, God's redeeming Son. You can't earn forgiveness from God. You can't buy or pay for it either. You can only receive it as a free gift, by faith, through the grace and mercy of God. The Lord Jesus paid our debt for us so that we could be forgiven. He took on Himself our punishment for our sins; He died in our place and then rose up again from the dead, victorious over all sin and death. The measure of God's love to us cannot be fathomed when we start to understand the cost that it was to the Godhead to rescue us for eternity. God is loving and merciful! Have you personally called out to the Lord Jesus to save you from God's just punishment for your sins? If you have, then from thereon, live totally dependent on Christ Jesus for everything that you need in this life and the next. We need to develop a child-like faith of trusting in the Lord with all our heart. Here are some practical things that we can do to help strengthen our trust in God:

Firstly, we need to draw close to God by reading the Bible and asking Him to help us to understand it. The Bible shows us God's character and His trustworthy ways. We can also get to know God better by spending time in prayer and worship with Him. The Bible says in Philippians, Chapter 4: "Don't worry about anything, but in all your prayers ask God for what you need, always asking him with a thankful heart. And God's peace, which is far beyond human understanding, will keep your hearts and minds safe in union with Jesus Christ." God's peace is ours before God shows how He will answer our prayers. We can ask God to give us a grateful heart, irrespective of our circumstances. And this is what it means to rejoice in Him, even if we are unfairly accused or suffering unjust treatment.

In 1 Thessalonians, Chapter 5, Verse 16, it says: "Be joyful always, pray at all times, be thankful in all circumstances. This is what God wants from you in your life in union with Christ Jesus." No matter what you face, never be afraid to gladly put your unknown future into the hands of our all-knowing Creator God.
