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BIBLE ADVENTURES SCRIPT:

**A2363 ~ Jesus missing from the Caravan.**

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*Welcome to Bible Adventures. Help for today. Hope for tomorrow. Jesus is Lord of all.*

In 1960, a young boy was helping his father to muster sheep on their rugged Australian property. Steven was his name. His father told Steven to take the dog and chase a few stray sheep and wait for him by the log at the gate.

As it so happened, there were two gates with a log beside them and the boy wasn't where his father expected him to be. Soon the boy was declared missing. Thousands of people joined in the search and on the fourth day he was found. He told his rescuers, "My dad is lost and I'm looking for him."

Such a ground swell of community care for others inspired a singer to write a song called "Little Boy Lost" and record it for radio stations to play. It became a favourite at the time.

Imagine how much guilt that Steven's father must have felt during those four long days! He was responsible for his son going missing in the first place. How happy this family was when they were reunited. But some families don't get a happy ending. Once in a while, a mother loses sight of her young child for only a short time; then she discovers the child under water and unable to be revived. The mother is wracked with guilt for not watching her child continually. This distress can last for years. So what is guilt and how can we deal with it?

Guilt is the feeling of shame and remorse at doing or saying the wrong thing, or not doing what was expected as the right thing. Usually the guilt felt is much worse if we cannot set the matter right. Then Satan the accuser steps in to remind us over and over that we were a failure.

The effect of unconfessed guilt on the human body is expressed in Psalm 32. At the time, King David was feeling an emotional wreck. He had tried to hide his wrongdoing with another man's wife. As a result, he planned the killing of the woman's husband so he could have her. A baby that resulted from his infidelity died at God's hand not long after it was born. Despite the ugly circumstances David found himself in, it would have been much better if he had confessed his adultery immediately to God and begged for forgiveness rather than taking matters into his own hands.

As a result, David experienced great guilt for a considerable time. He had no peace or rest, day or night. His body and mind experienced adverse reactions. When he resolved to acknowledge his sin before God, God instantly forgave him. Then David advised all godly people in distress to pray to God.

In today's Bible Adventure, Mary and Joseph lost the Son of God while travelling home from Jerusalem with a group of friends. They were responsible for Him. Their lack of attention to mind such an important child must have given them great feelings of guilt as they returned to Jerusalem to look for Him.

This incident in the life of the Lord Jesus is recorded in Luke's Gospel in the last section of Chapter 2. This is the only record in Scripture of what happened in the life of the Lord Jesus between His parents bringing him back to Nazareth and the start of his official ministry at the age of 30. The book of Luke describes this incident and shows that by 12 years of age Jesus had a very good grasp of Scripture and the ability to use sections to refute the wrong teachings of the Pharisees and scribes in God's temple.

In the previous two centuries before the birth of the Lord Jesus, the Jewish people had largely neglected God's worship and ways. To counter this, some of the priests went to the opposite extreme. In time they formed the Pharisee sect.

They tried to observe every tiny piece of the Law to justify themselves as righteous and holy. But in clarifying things so precisely, they added many rules that were not in the Law itself.

Instead of there being joy and love towards God in observing the 613 pieces of the Law, the people found all the extra requirements extremely burdensome. Often there were contradictions between what the Law said and what the Pharisees told the people to do. In fact, the extras made the Law null and void in many instances. Teaching people to live by keeping rules is called legalism, and it became the Jewish way of life. People had to be careful not to displease the Pharisees or they could be refused entrance to the Temple.

From Jesus' answer to His mother Mary's questions when He was found in the Temple, Jesus already knew what His life work was going to be. At that point, He must have also recognised that He was not going to be popular with the Temple rulers.

The Lord Jesus' presence and time on earth had been unique in world history. In recent times, there seems to be a coming together of world religions to make one large religious group where all gods are accepted except the God of the Bible. Genuine Christians claim Him as the only true God and are persecuted for this stand.

There is a common belief today that all religions lead to heaven. But how could this be? The Bible teaches many times about the existence of hell. Even in Christian churches, preachers don't seem to mention hell very often. At funeral services, those people present are usually given to understand that the person who died is in heaven, even if he lived an openly wicked life.

This acceptance of the broadening of who will be in heaven is in opposition of what the Bible says. Of all the world religions, only the God of the Bible claims the authority to decide how heaven with Him can be entered. The Bible is clear that no person on earth can pay the debt of their sins or by doing something good, somehow cancel the record of their sins to be eligible to enter heaven.

The Bible teaches that true eternal life is found only through a person asking the Lord Jesus to cancel their sins on their behalf. Perfect Jesus graciously paid the sin debt for all people by dying on a cruel criminal's cross and rising from the grave, never to die again. Anyone who calls on Jesus' name and believes Him to be the only acceptable way to God can enter heaven when their time on earth is finished.

Jesus' plan to rescue people hopelessly separated from God by their sin enables anyone from any religion of the world, including those without a religion at all, to come to the Lord Jesus and receive pardon for their sins. Through Jesus' forgiveness, any person, great or small, can thus enter heaven and live in God's presence and goodness eternally. The basis for this forgiveness is the belief that Jesus is both willing and able to forgive the sins of anyone, no matter how bad or secretive. We must hold fast to the truth that Jesus Christ is God and remember that all other prophets in history were not God Himself.

After Jesus has forgiven us of our sin and past, we must also forgive ourselves and not keep thinking back to the things we've done or not done years ago. Dwelling on the past will rob us of our faith and turn us away from being convinced that Jesus has really forgiven us.

Some memories may never fully fade away but Jesus living His life through His Spirit within us heals past hurts.

God always works for our good through every circumstance we face.

If Satan the accuser brings dealt-with sin and memories back to your mind, you must firmly reassure yourself from the Scriptures or spiritual songs that your sin is forgiven fully and freely by the Lord Jesus Himself. It's totally gone and forgotten before God. As one lady said, "I distinctly remember forgetting that." But our minds are not to be inactive. We must think on positive things like God's goodness and avoid those things that He reveals are displeasing to Him.

Once people receive Christ's great salvation for their souls, they should be like "one beggar telling other beggars where to find bread." We mustn't weaken in our conviction that Jesus Christ is God and humanity's only Saviour. Other religions continually try to undermine the divine truth of God through their teaching of other pathways to heaven. In the Bible book of Acts, Chapter 4, it says that in Jesus Christ: "There is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved."

Have you ever been lost in a big crowd or an unfamiliar city or in the countryside? Distressing as this might have been, a worse thing than this exists. It's the fate of a person who is lost spiritually in their sin.

If you are not sure that you will go to heaven or know Jesus' forgiveness and love for your life, pray to Him today. Ask for forgiveness and give Him your loyalty as the only Person who can give you true peace with God and make you fit for heaven.

Here's a comforting verse to remember from 1 John, Chapter 5, Verse 1: "Whoever believes that Jesus is the Christ is born of God."
